## Message from the Chairwoman of the Board of Trustees



Since the establishment of the Sawiris Foundation for Social Development in 2001, we have been committed to addressing the most challenging issues facing Egyptian society. Over more than two decades, the Foundation has focused on improving the lives of Egyptian citizens by tackling the most pressing problems such as poverty, unemployment, and the empowerment of women, children, and marginalized groups. We have also invested significantly in education and scholarship programs, believing that education is the key to real change.

In 2023, the Foundation unveiled its new strategy for the years 2023–2028, marking a major and crucial turning point in its developmental journey. This tactic helps us to continuously improve and optimize impact since it adheres to the philosophy of effective altruism, which relies on science and evidence-based approaches. This fundamental change improves our capacity to select the most impactful practices, backed by precise data and analysis, to maximize our impact on the communities we serve.

The outcomes of these changes are clear in the accomplishments we made in 2023, which are covered in full in this report. Our position as a learning organization that can adjust to growing social and economic problems has been reinforced. In addition, we have started new initiatives to fight Egypt's Multidimensional poverty, strengthen the most marginalized groups' resilience, and guarantee their access to basic supplies and services.

Over the past 23 years, Sawiris Foundation's achievements reflect tremendous efforts to improve the lives of nearly one million Egyptians across 24 governorates. Our work spans several sectors, including social empowerment, economic empowerment, and education, with investments exceeding EGP 3 billion. These efforts have aimed at providing equitable, high-quality education, creating jobs, and delivering essential services to families and communities facing difficult circumstances. Through our 'Bab Amal' program, which targets the poorest families, we've helped many transition from extreme poverty to more sustainable livelihoods. This has been achieved through comprehensive social and economic interventions, all of which undergo rigorous evaluation to ensure our investments have a tangible and measurable impact.

We have also supported nearly 140,000 people through initiatives focused on improving skills and providing sustainable employment opportunities, whether through training and employment or through financing micro and small enterprises.

Education has always been at the heart of our development vision. We have invested nearly EGP 1.5 billion. to support education at all levels, from early childhood to higher and executive education and scientific research. We provided scholarships to outstanding students and supported the establishment of community schools. Through our partnerships with prestigious universities in Egypt

and abroad, we have enabled young people to access high-quality education, helping them achieve their full potential and contribute to the development of their community. We have also worked on developing technical and vocational education through our leading educational institutions, such as El Gouna Technical Nursing Institute, which has graduated 400 highly skilled and professional nursing personnel, and the German Hotel School in El Gouna, which has developed the technical and vocational capabilities of nearly 970 students, preparing them to work in the tourism and hotel sector. To further support technical education, this year we launched the Red Sea Yachting Institute in El Gouna and established the Onsi Sawiris Applied Technology and Construction School. Through these institutions, we hope to change the stereotypical view of technical education and support more outstanding Egyptian cadres.

In line with our new strategy, the Foundation, in partnership with policymakers, civil society, the private sector, and government entities, is working on developing solutions tailored to the local context and supporting the most effective initiatives. We believe that collaboration with partners from various sectors is the best way to achieve sustainable development. Therefore, we always strive to build strong and diverse partnerships to enhance our impact and ability to implement sustainable interventions that make a real difference in the lives of those in greatest need.

As we work to increase our influence and accomplish even greater success in the coming years, our vision for a brighter future changes every year. We acknowledge that there are many obstacles and a long road ahead in the pursuit of sustainable development, but there is also a sense of hope. Together, we will keep pushing for social justice, community empowerment, support for underprivileged groups, and creative,

all-encompassing solutions to Egypt's pressing problems both now and in the future. We are certain that we will continue to succeed in the coming years with your collaboration.

In conclusion, words cannot fully express my profound gratitude to our partners in success, who have stood by our side every step of the way on this journey toward positive change, contributing sincerely and wholeheartedly to every achievement we realize. #### Message from the **Executive Director**



Dear friends and partners It is my pleasure to present the 2023 Annual Report of the Sawiris Foundation for Social Development.

Throughout 2023, the Foundation has worked diligently to launch a new five-year strategic plan. Our team adopted a collaborative approach to review the previous strategy (2019-2021). This process involved drawing valuable lessons from our field experiences, engaging with our implementation and funding partners, and identifying areas for improvement while building upon our past successes. We remain steadfast in our commitment to enhance the impact of our initiatives within Egyptian society and to lead the charge toward evidence-based development.

#### The development of the new strategy focuses on two main goals:

- Reducing Multidimensional Poverty by helping low-income families become more self-sufficient, meeting over 80% of their basic needs, and receiving a quality education.
- Empowering Agents of Change who have demonstrated the potential to make a significant impact on the lives of others, providing them with the tools and resources they need to become true agents of change and better serve their communities.

By applying the new strategic directions and goals to the Foundation's technical work sectors, we are progressing steadily towards achieving six new expected outcomes by mid-2028:

#### 1. Providing social protection to 100,000 families and individuals living in extreme poverty

We started broadening the focus of the Foundation's flagship program, "Bab Amal," to include more families in the interventions of the Social Empowerment sector in 2023. The program offers a structured and evidence-supported approach that has been previously tested to help underprivileged families move from extreme poverty to a more sustainable path using comprehensive social and economic development interventions.

#### 2. Enabling 20,000 underprivileged families to increase their income to cover their basic needs

The Economic Empowerment is already working toward this aim by providing training programs, appropriate jobs and opportunities, and actively promoting the growth of small and micro-enterprises. The sector is also broadening its research and evaluation of various sources of funding in the local environment, such as grants, loans with varying interest rates, in-kind support, as well as studying how their impact differentiates. We are also looking into new forms of assistance, such as equity funding, and ways to reduce risks for recipients.

#### Improving learning outcomes for 46,000 disadvantaged 3. students

The Foundation's Learning and Scholarships Sector provides high-quality educational opportunities for students at all academic levels, as well as in various scientific, literary, artistic, and vocational disciplines. This is achieved through the establishment of community schools, support for public schools, and modern educational methods. Notable interventions this year include the launch of two new educational institutions: The Onsi Sawiris Applied Technology and Construction School and the Red Sea Yachting Institute. These institutes join El Gouna Technical Nursing Institute and the German Hotel School El Gouna as successful educational entities powered by the Foundation.

#### Enhancing the qualifications of approximately 14,000 high-potential individuals

This section focuses on outstanding students, talented individuals in technical and higher

education, and executive leaders. The Foundation has always placed great importance on supporting scholarships at top universities, in addition to offering preparatory programs for high school students to apply for scholarships at leading universities locally and globally. One of the notable programs implemented in 2023 is the continuation of the "Chicago Booth Executive Education Program" El Gouna after a hiatus of over a year due to the global COVID-19 pandemic.

#### 5. Honoring 140 authors and writers for their contributions to enriching the Egyptian cultural scene over the next

Through the Sawiris Cultural Award, the Sawiris Foundation supports established and emerging writers for their literary excellence. For 19 years, the Sawiris Cultural Award has significantly enriched the Egyptian cultural scene by empowering agents of artistic change, creators and intellectuals. It has also managed to secure a notable rank amongst local and regional prizes. The number of entries in the competition has increased from 276 works in 2005 to 1,202 in 2023. We hope that in the next five years, the number of entries will exceed 1,500 annually, with up to 30 authors and writers honored per year.

#### 6. Supporting approximately 200 implementing partners with intensive capacity-building training to deliver effective programs within the most vulnerable communities

The Learning and Strategies Sector focuses on building the capacities of executive partners whilst allowing them to keep up with the necessary development curve in project implementation. This is in addition to supporting the processes of learning, innovation, evaluation, and review within the whilst allowing them to keep up with the necessary development curve in project implementation. One of the sector's key contributions in 2023 was organizing seminars and workshops to bridge the gap between policies and scientific evidence when implementing projects. engaging over 500 participants. This sector also produced several media products aimed at researchers, practitioners, and decision-makers in the field of development, such as the podcast series "Development Stories Hakawi Fel Tanmia. Furthermore, it supported development interventions with impact assessment studies that demonstrate their effectiveness, helping to

enhance the Foundation's regional and international standing and promoting a culture of designing programs based on scientific evidence.

In brief, the Foundation invested over EGP 400 million in 12 development programs spanning 78 projects in 2023, with an emphasis on Upper Egypt's most impoverished communities. Committed partnerships with over 40 entities added over EGP 100 million to the Foundation's project implementation budget.

Making predictions about the future gets increasingly challenging in uncertain and unpredictable times. Although we have a precise approach, we fully acknowledge that we may need to modify as we move forward, keeping an open mind to our constantly changing geopolitical status and taking into account any challenges that arise. As a result, the Sawiris Foundation considers its startegy development as a continuous process, and we feel it is critical to routinely evaluate our success and review our goals in light of the current context and global trends.

The Sawiris Foundation is also devoted to building a clear strategy for reacting to crises and emergencies, as the underprivileged require assistance during times of uncertainty, including changing social, economic, and political conditions, not to mention the impact of climate change. This could have an impact on the Foundation's strategic orientation in the event of an unanticipated crisis. Thus, Sawiris Foundation for Social Development is committed to dedicating efforts and resources to assist people who have suffered major losses or have been forced into poverty as a result of these crises.

In conclusion, I'd like to thank the Sawiris family, the Foundation's Board of Trustees and its staff for their ongoing efforts and serious dedication to sustainable development work. I would also like to thank all of our development partners, without whom we would not have been able to achieve these accomplishments of which we are proud. We have high hopes that we will accomplish our plans over the next five years.

This is accomplished by lifting these families out of poverty into more stable conditions, ensuring their access to essential services, and providing sustainable sources of income. These efforts help maintain their connection to local communities, while improving their well-being and strengthening their resilience against potential health and financial challenges.

## Bab Amal | "Door of Hope": Scaffolding Households out of Extreme Poverty

The "Bab Amal" program is an implementation of a targeted approach for the poorest households, designed by BRAC International. This program has proven successful in over 50 countries and a significant impact in diverse communities and contexts. Sawiris Foundation adopted the program in 2018, collaborating with relevant ministries, civil society organizations, research centers, and funding entities to develop a thoughtful strategy for the program's inputs, tailored to the context of extreme poverty in Egypt. The program is being implemented in the poorest villages in Assiut and Sohag governorates.

The program is based on a comprehensive and carefully structured developmental approach aimed at lifting households out of extreme poverty within an 18-month follow-up period after delivering productive assets to families. This approach relies on four key pillars:


- 1 Providing Social Protection
- Enhancing Livelihoods and Generating Income
- 3. Achieving Financial Inclusion
- 4. Promoting Social Empowerment



The preliminary results from the first phase of the program (November 2018 -October 2022) indicate that 83% of households successfully met all mandatory graduation criteria and are on a sustainable path out of poverty. These are highly promising results, and we are currently awaiting the final impact assessment results being conducted by the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Lab. The program's current second phase aims to validate a key result, which is that 80% or more of the target families are on a sustainable route out of poverty.







#### **Basic Services Program**

Sawiris Foundation implements innovative and cost-effective projects to help families in severe poverty gain access to essential services such as adequate housing, sanitation, electricity, clean water, and basic foods. By testing these innovative programs, cash, and in-kind services, we aim to expand the research base on initiatives that can effectively improve the living standards of families living in extreme poverty and significantly reduce multidimensional poverty.

## Monthly Food Support in Collaboration with the Egyptian Food Bank

This project is implemented within the framwork of the Monthly Food Support Program of the Egyptian Food Bank, aligning with the definition of food security by the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations. This definition emphasizes the regular access of individuals to sufficient, safe, and nutritious food to meet their dietary needs and preferences for growth, development, and maintaining an active and healthy life. The support provided by the Foundation primarily targets women heads of households, people with disabilities, and the elderly across Egypt, through the provision of monthly food packages that meet their nutritional needs.



#### **Education as a Pathway to Empowerment**

The primary goal of this project is to eliminate illiteracy and empower women in the most marginalized villages in Giza Governorate, with a focus on beneficiaries of the "Takaful and Karama" program under the Ministry of Social Solidarity. The project addresses several important aspects, including contributing to the educational empowerment of the beneficiaries and reducing their illiteracy rates. provides them with awareness sessions on various topics uch as self-image improvement, parenting, public health, and legal awareness, as well as educating them on important social issues affecting women, such as female genital mutilation and early marriage. Additionally, the project offers training on small business management and achieving financial security, utilizing the award-winning "Women and Life" approach from UNESCO. Furthermore, interactive activities are conducted with the children of beneficiaries to enhance their educational skills through a dedicated children's corner, which operates in parallel with the training sessions for the beneficiaries to create a supportive and nurturing environment.



#### Support for Children without Parental Care Program

The Sawiris Foundation focuses on providing services to children deprived of parental care, with the aims to enhance and strengthen the family role by preventing unnecessary child separation and providing safe family care options. However, not all children qualify for family care; therefore, the Foundation works at various levels and types of community integration, aiming to provide support to children living in highly vulnerable situations through services in care homes, shelters, and mobile units.

#### Highlights of Key Projects



#### **Inclusive Communities**

The project aims to enhance the developmental capabilities—cognitive, motor, linguistic, and social—while also supporting the self-care of 500 children with disabilities in Assiut Governorate. This is achieved through adopting a community-based rehabilitation strategy, which involves equipping centers to develop the skills of children with disabilities and providing capacity-building sessions facilitated by specialized consultants. The project also works to strengthen government institutions' capacities to accommodate and integrate children with disabilities and raise public awareness in the surrounding community about the rights of persons with disabilities and the necessity of their inclusion in all aspects of life..

## Support for Families in Extreme Poverty during Emergencies

It has become clear to us over the past two years that there is an urgent need to respond to economic and health crises in a swift, effective, and purposeful manner. As a result, Sawiris Foundation is committed to providing timely emergency responses throughout Egypt, especially in border and remote areas. Over the next five years, we will work to fund programs that provide rapid emergency responses for the most vulnerable and marginalized groups, particularly supporting families affected by current and future crises that may negatively impact their livelihoods.

#### Highlights of Key Projects



#### Supporting the Egyptian Red Crescent's Emergency Preparedness and Response Capabilities

The project's approach focuses on the necessary preparations to provide emergency relief services across all governorates in Egypt. Over the past years, up until the end of 2023, Sawiris Foundation has supported the Red Crescent's fleet with 43 relief vehicles, enabling the organization to deliver medical aid and transport volunteers to affected areas. In 2023, these convoys participated in providing relief support to the Gaza Strip as part of the national coalition's efforts to assist the Palestinian people in the face of Israeli aggression on the region.



## Economic Empowerment Sector

By funding training programs, providing suitable employment opportunities, and effectively supporting the growth of small and micro-enterprises, the Economic Empowerment sector aims to bridge the gap between supply and demand in Egypt's labor market, particularly in the most impoverished communities. Through its programs, the sector targets job seekers as well as potential and existing small and micro-entrepreneurs, aiming to support families living in multidimensional poverty to cover their basic needs by 2028. Our targeting also extends to indirect beneficiaries, such as the family members of job seekers and business owners.

#### Training and employment

Over the next five years, the Training and Employment Program will support job seekers. It will also promote high-quality vocational training in essential life and practical skills for employment, assisting job seekers in finding and maintaining decent jobs. The program will enhance technical programs that help job seekers align with the requirements of the digital economy, fund initiatives that streamline the job search process within and across governorates, reduce job search costs, and facilitate effective information flow between job seekers and employers, particularly targeting youth, women, and persons with disabilities.

#### Highlights of Key Projects



#### **Benaa: Employing Youth in Elderly** and Chronic Illness Care

This project, which is currently in its second phase, aims to to equip young male and female beneficiaries with the necessary job skills, especially nursing skills, for caring for the elderly and those with chronic diseases. ## Small and Micro-Enterprise Development Program

As part of our efforts to combat poverty, we aim to support the creation, expansion, and management of small enterprises by providing in-kind or financial support to small business owners. This support is intended to enhance their capacities and helping them meet their basic needs, leading to further economic prosperity and job creation within their communities. Over the next five years, we plan to fund projects that explore new and innovative microcredit products, such as group lending, micro equity, loans, or insurance products with longer grace periods. We will also pay special attention to low-interest small loans, supported by evidence, which we will initially test with microfinance NGOs.


## Future of Tomato Crop: Improving Productivity and Value Chains

The project aims to improve the annual income of 300 families of tomato farmers, including 90 women, and to reduce the post-harvest losses of the beneficiaries' tomato crops by 15%. It will also equip 1,500 farmers with skills in healthy drying techniques, as well as knowledge and awareness of agricultural processes, harvesting, and post-harvest processes. The project's sustainability relies on the presence of a solar-powered dryer within tomato-growing areas, overseen by a trained management team operating professionally and efficiently according to specific plans.











## Education & Scholarships Sector

The Education and Scholarships Sector aims to empower children and youth (both male and female) aged 2 to 22 years old who are living in poverty or extreme poverty by providing them with high-quality educational opportunities to achieve better learning outcomes. The sector also offers a diverse range of local and international scholarships for outstanding students and executive leaders to support their high capabilities and prepare distinguished cadres.

# **Pre-Primary Education Program**

This program supports projects that focus on raising awareness about the value of pre-primary education to highlight its importance in early childhood development. The program aims to increase children's enrollment in preschools, provide innovative quality educational services for this stage, and enhance the parents' understanding of the changes their children experience during early childhood.

# **Early Years Matter**

This project seeks to ensure that the most marginalized and socially excluded children, particularly those with special needs, receive a high-quality public education in nurseries. The goal is to give these youngsters a fair opportunity to realize their potential and contribute productively to society in the future. The project entails creating and designing an inclusive education model for pre-primary education, preparing Ministry of Education staff to meet the individual learning needs of children with disabilities, and providing supplies for twenty resource rooms in Assiut, Sohag, and Beheira. In addition, the initiative aims to raise parental and caregiver understanding of acceptable child nutrition practices as well as the usage of water, sanitation, and hygiene facilities in the selected establishments.

# **Developing and Upgrading Nurseries of NGOs**

The project aims to provide comprehensive and high-quality educational and developmental services to children aged 2 to 4 years in 50 preschool classrooms affiliated with the Ministry of Social Solidarity, to be models of efficient preschools across Egypt. The project covers several aspects, including improving and upgrading infrastructure, furniture, and civil defense, safety, and security equipment. It also involves enhancing the skills of service providers in preschools and staff working in the family and child departments of the targeted social solidarity directorates and offices, implementing an effective preschool management system, and providing food donations to 1,000 families with preschool children.





















# **Basic Education Program**

The increasing costs of public education can be a significant burden for many Egyptian families living in extreme poverty. Previous work experience has demonstrated that many families lack financial resources, hindering their children's school enrollment and putting them at risk of dropping out. Therefore, we provide need-based scholarships in an attempt to remove this barrier to enrollment in basic education stages, followed by higher or vocational education. We also support the establishment and development of community schools in areas lacking schools, in addition to working on improving teachers' skills. Over the next five years, we will continue to support programs through the Education and Scholarship Sector to enhance learning outcomes for students in basic education.




# **Schools for Egypt**

This project is based on the concept of single-classroom community schools, which strive to give high-quality education to children who have not registered in primary schools or have dropped out, particularly in distant and underserved towns and small villages. Since its inception in 2013, the project has helped to furnish, support, and build 60 community schools across the governorates of Assiut, Sohag, and Qena.







In addition to existing partnerships, Sawiris Foundation is working with Bank ABC to provide all schools with educational digital equipment, with a budget of EGP 6.5 million. We also collaborate with the Digital School Initiative, one of Mohammed Bin Rashid Al Maktoum Global Initiatives, to train community education facilitators to use technology in teaching across 34 schools.

# Technical & Vocational Education Program

Sawiris Foundation supports vocational education to create a highly skilled and well-educated vocational workforce by offering scholarships for students to enroll in high-quality vocational schools and institutes in Egypt, or through schools and institutes owned and managed by the Foundation. It also plans to document and share expertise and knowledge to promote effective and distinguished models for vocational education graduates, guiding them toward high-quality vocational education opportunities that can secure outstanding job prospects in the labor market.

# **German Hotel School El Gouna (GHS)**

The first private international hotel school in Egypt, accredited by the German Chamber of Commerce and Industry in Leipzig (IHK), offers a diploma in the hotel industry recognized by the Egyptian Ministry of Education. The school provides dual vocational education (practical and theoretical) under the supervision of international and Egyptian experts, in collaboration with top hotels in the Red Sea governorate and El Gouna, meeting the demands of the international job market. Students enroll after completing middle school, and all receive partial financial scholarships, while excellent students can obtain full scholarships covering all tuition and living expenses. The school features classrooms and laboratories equipped with the latest educational tools, follows advanced curricula and practical techniques, and provides high-quality on-campus accommodation for both male and female students.

# **El Gouna Technical Nursing Institute (GTNI)**

One of the best technical nursing institutes in Egypt, established by Sawiris Foundation in 2009, reflecting the Foundation's belief in the importance of technical and vocational education. It was created as part of an international partnership with Lawrence Memorial/Regis College in Massachusetts, USA (2009-2017), and is under the supervision of the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research. The institute is equipped with the latest educational tools, including fully equipped laboratories to enable students develop their scientific and practical nursing skills. The Foundation provides full scholarships for students holding a high school diploma, with enrollment managed through the central admission office. The program spans two and a half years of theoretical and practical study, followed by a mandatory practical training period in a hospital as a prerequisite for obtaining the technical nursing diploma.

# Red Sea Yachting (RSY) Institute



The Red Sea Yachting Institute was established in 2023 with license No. 1 from the Egyptian Authority for Maritime Safety as the first institute of its kind in Egypt. It is also accredited by the Royal Yachting Association in England. The Institute offers a series of free scholarships annually to train yacht sailors to obtain a maritime certification for 300-tonne or less yachts.

### The scholarship supports applicants for:

- 1. Necessary teams from the Maritime Postgraduate Studies Institute in Alexandria, qualifying the applicant for a maritime work permit.
- Accredited certificate of the Red Sea Yachting Institute, qualifying the applicant to obtain a license from the Egyptian Authority for Maritime Safety to become sailors on Egyptian territorial waters.
- International certificates approved by the Royal Yachting Association in England, qualifying the applicant for work on international yachts.
- 4. Accredited Certificates from Berlitz in the English Language.
- 5. Accredited Certificates from Rezem Center for Marine Behaviors and Environment Training.





# **Onsi Sawiris Applied Technology** and Construction School (OSCS)

Sawiris Foundation, in cooperation with the Ministry of Education and Vocational Education and Orascom Construction, signed a cooperation protocol for the establishment of the 'Onsi Sawiris Applied Technology and Construction School'. The school aims to create highly trained technical personnel in the field of construction finishing, in an efficient institutional framework. It provides an Egyptian certificate that meets international standards in the training of technical personnel and provides practical training during the study period, providing job opportunities after graduation, in line with Egypt's vision to develop and improve the quality of vocational education and its outputs, and to fully qualify students to join the labor market after graduation.

# **Chicago Booth Executive Education Program in El Gouna**

In an effort to support Egypt's Vision 2030 for sustainable development and the plan to build and develop the capacities of leaders in both the public and private sectors, we launched a partnership with the University of Chicago in 2019. This partnership aims to enhance decision-making skills among executive leaders through an innovative curriculum, combining traditional and experiential learning to address the challenges and opportunities facing emerging markets and how to deal with them.

The "Chicago Booth Executive Education" program is the first of its kind in Egypt. It aims to strengthen networking between the private and public sectors, and foster collaboration to support development and progress in Egypt, particularly in managing economic crises. The program focuses on various topics, including financial technology, artificial intelligence, leadership, innovation, and decision-making. Full scholarships are provided to participants from the public sector, while partial scholarships are available for executives in the private sector.






# **Egypt Impact Lab**

The lab was launched to enhance poverty reduction policies in Egypt through rigorous evaluation of innovative government programs. The lab funds randomized evaluations of government innovations related to any of the lab's thematic areas, which include:

- Social protection and poverty alleviation
- Employment development and SME growth
- Women's empowerment and family development
- Environment, energy, and climate change

Additionally, the lab offers the MENA Scholars Fellowship for researchers in the Middle East and North Africa, providing a pathway for region-based researchers to build skills and expertise in designing and conducting randomized evaluations of poverty reduction and social development policies. In June 2023, the lab welcomed its first cohort of MENA Scholars after a competitive selection process, with the fellows joining the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab in the Middle East and North Africa.

# «Hakawy fe Al-Tanmia» Podcast

The "Hakawy fe Al-Tanmia" Development Stories podcast is one of the knowledge-based media products of the Foundation, aimed at researchers, development professionals, and policymakers. In its first season, the podcast showcased several models and experiences in poverty reduction, especially in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic and the Russia-Ukraine war. It also raised important questions about how to combat poverty, the challenges we face, and how to use science to maximize and better allocate limited resources. Over the course of four episodes, we featured experiences from partners, experts, and scholars in the field of development, discussing key concepts such as comprehensive social protection, unemployment reduction, the impact of social values on women's employment opportunities, and presented inspiring examples like the "Bab Amal" program.





# **Annual meeting of**



Sawiris Foundation supported the organization of the annual meeting of the Arab Foundations Forum (AFF) in Cairo this year. During the three-day event, representatives from Arab institutions discussed ways to enhance their partnerships in response to current and future challenges. They also shared the latest scientific evidence and lessons learned from the experiences of leading Arab and global institutions.

Sawiris Foundation moderated a panel discussion entitled "Advanced Science and Policy Towards the Resilience and Adaptability for the Most Vulnerable" to present approaches that aimto enable Arab development donors to build programs and finance projects capable of supporting those most in need, taking into account the challenges of the accumulation of poverty in these fragile societies as well as emerging climate challenges.





# **Bridging Evidence and Policy Seminar Series**

In cooperation with





2023 witnessed three seminars aimed at linking development policies with scientific evidence by creating momentum for the design of evidence-based programs, providing NGOs, civil society actors and decision makers with knowledge and tools, sharing global and local best practices for using evidence-based programming. The first seminar focused on impact assessments of social protection programs and was coordinated with the Ministry of Social Solidarity and the Ministry of Communications and Information Technology. The second seminar discussed how to resort to careful scientific research to reach actual beneficiaries. In the context of the region's ongoing crises, seminar III provided experiences of relief work and how to respond to and recover from crises. The series' presentation is to be completed to discuss more around social protection, how to achieve food security in a scientific way and calls to reduce climate impact and support agricultural development.

# Conference on Evidence on Local Development in Egypt

As part of Sawiris Foundation's efforts with our implementation partners to provide evidence-based support, and implement effective altruism in developmental work, a training was held focusing on the design of evaluations for social programs to measure their impact scientifically. This allows for the assessment of their effectiveness and learning the lessons that maximize the impact of social programs in Egypt. The training concluded with a conference that brought together officials from several donors and leading developmental organizations in Egypt with their partners from prominent NGOs implementing development projects, along with





professors and researchers studying the impact of these programs. This gathering facilitated a significant step toward formulating unified and comprehensive concepts and directions regarding the future of social programs undertaken by the participating institutions and organizations. This supports the idea of maximizing impact and promotes a necessary approach to relying on scientific evidence in designing and evaluating developmental interventions and policies to ensure they achieve their goals and to disseminate lessons learned about common mistakes and how to avoid them.

### **Diarna Annual Exhibition**

For the third consecutive year, Sawiris Foundation participated in organizing and sponsoring the annual "Diarna" exhibition for handicrafts, which was held and inaugurated at Cairo Festival City Mall. # World Food Loss and Waste Awareness Day Initiative





In response to ALEXBANK initiative to support the Egyptian Food Bank's school feeding program, Sawiris Foundation provided 30,000 healthy meals over the course of a month to students at Mohamed Salem Primary School in Fayoum Governorate, in coordination with the Egyptian Food Bank.

School meals serve as an incentive for regular attendance, and in some cases, they are the only meal a student may have during the day. Given the Sawiris Foundation's focus on sustainable, long-term development interventions, the Foundation, in collaboration with the Egyptian Food Bank, plans to launch a comprehensive school feeding program based on scientific evidence, targeting the improvement of food security for 50,000 students daily. This intervention aims to support students' physical and mental health while promoting proper nutritional behaviors.

Sawiris Foundation signed a memorandum of understanding with ZED Sports Investments — a subsidiary of Ora Developers — to organize the first training program in Egypt designed to create a well-prepared infrastructure of Egyptian athletes. This program aims to supply national teams with top talent to achieve milestones for Egyptian sports by developing the life skills of 40 young athletes at ZED Football Club and improving their language proficiency, especially English, in collaboration with leading educational institutions. The program is rooted in the Foundation's belief in providing equal opportunities for talented youth in marginalized communities, equipping them to compete internationally in football.



# **Spreading Hope**

This partnership supports the "A Home That Protects Me" project under Sawiris Foundation, one of the key projects within the essential services program aimed at providing safe and healthy housing in the most impoverished villages in Upper Egypt. Additionally, the agreement directly supports the medical convoys component, offering medical checkups, exams, and medications for children in specialties such as orthopedics, ophthalmology, dermatology, and ENT, specifically in the villages of Beni Suef, Sohag, and Aswan, through 55 medical convoys. The initiative also includes health awareness services covering pollution causes, proper nutrition, personal hygiene, and the impact of vaccinations on children's healthy growth.












# Sawiris Cultural Award


