



# ANNUAL REPORT 2024

Established in 2001, Sawiris Foundation for Social Development (SFSD) was founded on the conviction that human dignity should never be the preserve of a privileged few, but rather a fundamental right afforded to all. Every individual — regardless of origin or circumstance — deserves a fair opportunity to quality education, a safe home, and decent work. Over twenty-four years, we have realized that a true legacy is defined by the impact we inspire in people's lives—the dreams we help children pursue, and the future we strive to shape for a nation we hold dear and are proud to serve with dedication.

SFSD has never viewed itself as a charity in the conventional sense. Rather, an active partner in meaningful development. We did not stand at a distance, removed from the realities of hardship; instead we made a conscious choice to witness challenges, to listen with attention to those who endure them, to discern how we might meaningfully contribute to the solution, and to work in genuine partnership with communities—not merely on their behalf, but shoulder to shoulder with them.

Throughout our journey, we have faced many trials and drawn valuable lessons along the way. We have paused to honor the milestones that have illuminated the path ahead, even as we navigated the full spectrum of challenges that any institution inevitably faces in the pursuit of growth and continuous learning. Now, more than twenty years on, we move forward with deeper insight, greater maturity, and a renewed sense of purpose – prepared to carry the mission onward with steadfast

In 2024, we advanced with renewed purpose and steadfast determination to deepen and broaden our impact. A total of sixty-four development projects were carried out across multiple governorates throughout Egypt, with cumulative investments exceeding EGP 650 million, to reach more than 21,000 beneficiaries across sectors, including education, economic and social empowerment, and culture.

This year marked a pivotal juncture, witnessing the early outcomes of the SFSD's 2023-2028 strategy, anchored in evidence-based interventions and sustained through long-term investment. At its core, the strategy is designed to reduce multidimensional poverty and to empower agents of change to drive lasting, meaningful impact in the lives of individuals and

Within this framework, the Bab Amal ("Door of Hope") program stands as a cornerstone to our strategic efforts. Its impact has reached over 6,750 of Egypt's most vulnerable households. With an expansion plan, the program aspires to reach 100,000 households by 2028 through close collaboration with partners across the public and private sectors, as well as civil society.

In the realm of scholarships, SFSD has continued to create a meaningful impact on the lives of thousands of high-achieving Egyptian students. Through a diverse portfolio of scholarship programs, SFSD have expanded access to quality academic opportunities at leading institutions - both within Egypt and

Concurrently, we have remained resolute in our commitment to enhancing the quality of basic education and advancing student learning outcomes. More than 7,680 children have benefited from our interventions in early childhood development and basic education, including the 'Teaching at the Right Level' program, which has proven effective in strengthening children's reading/numeracy skills.

As part of our strategic vision to elevate technical education and vocational training, while reshaping societal perceptions, SFSD continued investing in its flagship educational institutions. In addition to El-Gouna Technical Nursing Institute (GTNI) and the German Hotel School El Gouna (GHS), 2023 marked the launch of Red Sea Yacht (RSY) Institute—the first facility of its kind in Egypt and the broader region. In 2024, we embarked on a new chapter with the enrolment of the inaugural cohort at Onsi Sawiris School for Applied Technology and Construction (OSATC), with an endeavor to cultivate a new generation of highly skilled technicians, ready to meet the evolving needs of the job market.

Amid the escalating global challenges—from humanitarian crises and the repercussions of climate change to the decline in international development financing—the imperative for more resilient and high-impact solutions has never been more urgent. As pressures on public and international funding streams continue to intensify, private philanthropy is increasingly emerging as a vital driver for transformative change, with its independence, agility, and capacity for innovation.

In this context, we believe that strategic, impact-driven philanthropy is far more than a mere source of funding. Rather, it stands as a foundational force in reconceptualizing the notion of development through its emphasis on measurable outcomes, its prioritization of investment in transformative solutions, and its commitment to cross-sector partnerships that foster sustainable change.

From this vantage point, SFSD's model assumes particular significance—seamlessly integrating strategic foresight with an unwavering commitment to social responsibility, and a genuine capacity for adaptation in an ever-evolving landscape, both locally and globally.

Looking ahead, we aspire to remain a learning and impactful organization, not only through the programs we implement but also through rigorous research and data-driven decision-making. Through this, we aim to support policymakers and foster a culture of innovation, transparency, and accountability while also building trust-based partnerships grounded in knowledge-sharing.

In recent years, we have placed a particular emphasis on expanding strategic partnerships across the public and private sectors, as well as with civil society—locally, regionally, and internationally. These efforts have enabled us to mobilize nearly EGP 574 million in funding through collaborations with more than 84 organizations, reflecting the growing confidence in our model, and credibility.

None of our achievements over the years would have come to fruition without the dedication and commitment of our partners—those who dared to dream with us, who shouldered the responsibility alongside us, and who walked by our side every step of the journey. To each of you, we extend our deepest gratitude and heartfelt appreciation. It is your trust, spirit of collaboration, and belief in our mission that have rendered this shared impact not only possible but truly enduring. Much like the Egyptian artisan whose hands, attuned to the essence beyond mere appearance, craft beauty from the humblest of fibres.

I am pleased to present the 2024 Annual Report of Sawiris Foundation for Social Development (SFSD) — an edition inspired by the timeless poetic words of Ahmed Shawqi, which speak to the courage required to confront adversity. It is this very spirit of determination and boldness that has guided our course through a year marked by significant changes and defining decisions.

Today, we find ourselves in a world increasingly unsettled by a cascade of crises — from devastating wars and global pandemics to persistent economic volatility and profound social disruption — traditional solutions are no longer sufficient. Development can no longer be approached as a series of fragmented, short-term interventions; rather, it must be envisioned as a forward-looking and integrated endeavor—one that demands deep insight, bold action, and sustained collaboration across all sectors of society.

Since its establishment in 2001, SFSD has dedicated a At SFSD, we do not regard partnerships merely as commitment to tackling the most urgent challenges facing marginalized populations, channeling over EGP 4.4 billion in support over more than two decades. As I assumed the role of Executive Director in 2024, we embarked on a new chapter guided by a renewed sense of purpose to accelerate the implementation of our five-year strategy (2023–2028). This vision is firmly anchored in the ethos of 'effective altruism' and guided by a rigorous, evidence-based approach to decision-making, all in pursuit of delivering the greatest possible impact.

Despite the considerable challenges encountered over the past year, SFSD achieved tangible milestones across its strategic performance indicators, with improvements ranging from 10% to 30%. Throughout, we remained committed to operational efficiency, with administrative expenditures maintained at approximately 13% of total spending. On the technical and programmatic front, we invested over EGP 650 million across 64 development-focused projects, positively impacting the lives of more than 20,000 citizens. In the Social Empowerment sector, over 6,750 of Egypt's extremely poor households benefited from the services provided through the Bab Amal ("Door of Hope") program. In the Economic Empowerment sector, a total of 1,300 young men and women secured employment within the healthcare sector, while 900 small enterprises accessed financial support through our innovative Micro-Equity

In the Education and Scholarships sector, we extended support to more than 300 students pursuing higher education and over 400 students enrolled in technical education. These efforts were complemented by a diverse portfolio of thematic programs – most notably Mawheba ("Talent"), an initiative dedicated to nurturing emerging musical talent, delivered in partnership with the Grand Egyptian Museum, the Royal College of Music in London, and Community Jameel. Through Sawiris Cultural Award, in its twentieth edition, SFSD continued to uphold its legacy of championing creative literary talent. At the same time, our support for the El Gouna Film Festival enabled the participation of 150 emerging filmmakers, helping to foster the next generation of creative voices shaping the landscape of Arab cinema.

This year witnessed a significant expansion of our strategic partnerships, with more than nine new collaborations forged across government entities, international institutions, research centres, and civil society organizations.

### **Bab Amal: A Sustainable Pathway Out of Poverty**

The Bab Amal (Door of Hope) program aims to reduce multidimensional poverty by placing ultra-poor families on a sustainable livelihood pathway through four interconnected pillars:

- **Social Protection** 1.
- 2. **Livelihood Enhancement and Income Generation**
- 3. **Financial Inclusion**
- **Social Empowerment**

In 2018, the Sawiris Foundation adopted the "Graduation Approach," originally developed by BRAC International. It was successfully implemented in over 50 countries and has positively impacted more than 14 million individuals worldwide. Global evaluations have consistently demonstrated its effectiveness in achieving sustainable improvements across social, economic, and psychological dimensions.

In Egypt, Sawiris Foundation conducted a comprehensive evaluation of the program. Forty months after the interventions concluded, results indicated sustained improvements in income and employment opportunities, with a strong focus on women's empowerment, adapted to the local context. The evaluation also confirmed the effectiveness of low-cost implementation models, reinforcing the case for scaling to reach more families.

Sawiris Foundation is working with partners to expand the program, aiming to reach 100,000 Egyptian families by 2028 to lift them out of extreme poverty and onto more sustainable livelihood paths. This expansion directly supports Egypt's national goals of poverty eradication and social

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In the village of Hagar Mishta, amid narrow alleyways and collapsing homes, Raheel endured a life of unrelenting hardship. She shared a crumbling house with her husband-who subjected her to constant physical and psychological abuse-and their five children. She was denied even the most basic human rights. Her home was not a refuge, but a prison—its walls built not of stone, but of silence and fear.

For Raheel, hope had disappeared long ago—and with it, her will to keep going. In a moment of suffocating despair, she set herself on fire in a desperate attempt to escape her suffering. The fire indirectly led to the death of two of her children. Raheel survived, but with severe burns that disfigured her body. A brave neighbor wrapped her in a blanket to extinguish the flames, saving her life. In that moment, fate offered her a second chance.

A tragic as the incident was, it marked a turning point in Raheel's life. After coming so close to death, a flicker of hope emerged when her family was selected to join the Bab Amal (Door of Hope) program. Through the initiative, she received a small livestock project—two female sheep and their newborns. This marked the beginning of a new chapter.

Raheel managed the project herself. Slowly but steadily, her work began to grow. She sold one sheep and used the proceeds to buy another, investing her earnings in feed to increase productivity. In a short time, she had a small, diversified business, combining sheep rearing with a small grocery.

Eventually, the value of her business reached 11,000 Egyptian pounds.

With every step forward, Raheel felt as though she was rebuilding her life. But the most profound transformation happened within. In a moment of quiet reflection, she said: "God brought me back to life twice—once when I survived the fire, and once when I received the business." Her words captured a deep inner shift-from a woman seeking escape to one embracing life with renewed purpose and hope.

The transformation didn't stop with Raheel. Her children, once forced to drop out of school, were able to resume their education. She enrolled in a literacy class and became the first woman in her village to earn an educational certificate. The family also benefited from the Hayah Karima (Decent Life) initiative, which helped renovate their home and secure access to clean drinking water. Raheel underwent three state-funded reconstructive surgeries to reduce the physical scars left by the fire.

Raheel's community came to see her as a symbol of strength and determination. She emerged from her isolation, joined savings groups, and rebuilt social relationships. For the first time, she felt a sense of security and dignity, secured by a legal agreement her husband was required to sign, pledging not to harm her physically or emotionally.

Today, Raheel is not only a woman who survived a tragedy. She is a living story of resilience, courage, and the will to achieve what once seemed impossible.

# **Basic Services Program**

The program aims to ensure access to essential services for ultra-poor households, with the goal of improving their quality of life. This includes housing improvements, access to clean water and sanitation, and enhanced food security.

### **Support for Children without Parental Care Program**

This program aims to strengthen child protection systems and services by advancing the following key objectives:

- Raising awareness among different groups of the target communities about the situation of children without parental care.
- Creating a safe and nurturing environment that supports the healthy development of children whether in residential care institutions or with alternative families.
- Providing targeted support to children living in high-risk situations, including those in street situations.



Her small eyes shimmered with wonder as she watched a girl twirling with delight, clutching a brand-new doll, and a boy nestled warmly in his family's embrace, sharing a warm meal. In silence, Arzaq's thoughts drifted: Do these children have warm homes? Do they have rooms of their own? Do they feel safe and cared for? She, on the other hand, had no shelter but the pavement, and no refuge except the corner she had chosen to rest her exhausted body.

Arzaq is a child of unknown parentage, homeless since birth, save for the streets and public squares. Deprived of the warmth of a family and denied even the most basic rights of childhood, she learned from her earliest days that life had little to offer beyond hardship. Every day, she struggled for food and fought against the cruel stares of strangers that made her feel like a shadow, undeserving of existence. Her dark skin made her the target of ridicule and bullying. Fate had other plans for her.

One day, a mobile unit from the Banati Foundation was making rounds, and a social worker caught sight of Arzaq. She was carrying a cardboard box filled with tissue packets and knocking on car windows to ask for food. The caseworker gently approached her, asked about her story, and tried to reassure her with kindness. Arzaq looked at her with suspicion, silently wondering,

"Is this real?" Despite her hesitation, she decided to go with her. That decision marked the beginning of her new life.

In 2017, Arzaq joined the Banati Foundation, starting her journey. While her education had previously been a distant dream, the foundation supported her to enroll in a community school and a psychosocial rehabilitation program that helped her overcome her fears. It wasn't long before she began to shine: she completed primary school in less than four years and transitioned to formal education at the preparatory level. Today, she is in the third year of preparatory school, and is among the top of her class.

Arzaq also joined the swimming team, taking on new challenges. She quickly rose to become one of the team's strongest athletes, earning several trophies, like the Cairo Winter Championship for two consecutive years (2023 and 2024), as well as the national championship title in 2023.

Today, Arzaq stands as a living example of determination and willpower. She no longer dwells on her painful past; she looks proudly toward her future. She dreams of becoming a world swimming champion so that her story might reach every child who has endured what she once did. She says "Believe in your strength. Start from where you are. Know that you have the power to achieve the impossible—no matter the circumstances." The little girl, once left to face life alone, has become a radiant symbol of resilience and success.



In the heart of Mansheat Al-Iqal Al-Bahary village in Assiut, lives Abeer, a 32-year-old woman who shares a modest rural home with nine members of her family. Raised in a conservative community where rigid social norms restrict women's roles and divorce carries unforgiving stigma, Abeer refused to see herself through society's narrow lens. Since childhood, she carried a quiet dream that lit something inside her: to become a nurse.

From a young age, she was known in her village as "Dr. Abeer," and the dream of joining nursing school accompanied her every step, but life had other plans. A series of devastating losses shook her world: first, the death of her eldest brother from brain atrophy; then, the passing of her sister to the same illness. A third tragedy followed when her youngest sister died from a bee sting while in North Sinai. In the face of such sorrow, Abeer's dreams stopped; she had no choice but to enroll in a commercial secondary school.

After graduation, she worked as a receptionist at a private hospital. There, her dream awakened, bringing with it renewed hope. However, that spark was soon dimmed by yet another hardship: a marriage that lasted less than a year, ending with Abeer returning to her village as a single mother to her young daughter, Hanin. There, she was met not with compassion, but with the harsh judgment of a society quick to condemn.

Despite the stares and judgment, Abeer started over with a modest job at an accessories shop,

Despite the stares and judgment, Abeer started over with a modest job at an accessories shop, earning no more than EGP 500 a month to carve out a better future for herself and her daughter. During that period, a marriage proposal stirred a brief sense of renewed hope. But once again, life took an unexpected turn: the suitor disappeared without explanation, even after the marriage contract had been signed. The label of "divorced" returned—but this time, it did not break her. On the contrary, her spirit grew more resilient, her resolve deepened, and her sense of self became stronger than ever.

Abeer made a conscious choice to rise above her circumstances. She enrolled in a caregiving and elder support training program, implemented by the Giving Without Limits (GWLA) Association with funding from the Sawiris Foundation. In this program, she found not only a valuable opportunity but also a space to unlock her potential. She worked hard and excelled, earning an accredited certificate from the Faculty of Medicine at Assiut University.

This milestone marked a profound turning point in Abeer's life. She began working as an elderly caregiver, and over time, both her financial and social circumstances improved. More importantly, she regained her confidence and the courage to dream once more. "I lived under the pressure of a harsh society, but the program gave me a new family. It taught me how to live independently and fight for myself and my daughter."

### **Small Enterprise Development Program**

The program aims to support small business owners who operate independently by helping them establish or manage small enterprises—or both. This support may take the form of in-kind or financial assistance to help them meet their basic needs.



To rigorously assess its effectiveness, the initiative is undergoing a randomized controlled trial (RCT) — widely regarded as the gold standard in program evaluation. This assessment is designed to measure the impact of improved kindergarten quality and targeted nutritional support on early childhood development outcomes, as well as on women's participation in the labor force in Egypt.

### The Basic Education Program

The rising cost of public education remains a serious barrier for Egyptian families living in extreme poverty. Field-based observations have consistently revealed the inability of many households to afford school enrollment fees, rendering their children vulnerable to early dropout and long-term educational marginalization.

To help mitigate this critical challenge, the Basic Education Program offers merit-based scholarships that grant students access to primary education and support them in pursuing diverse academic trajectories—whether toward higher education or technical and vocational training. Simultaneously, this program supports the establishment and advancement of community-based schools in underserved regions, while investing in the professional development of educators to elevate the overall quality of instruction.

### **Key Projects**

### **Teaching at the Right Level (TaRL)**

The current phase of the "Teaching at the Right Level" (TaRL) projects is dedicated to strengthening foundational literacy and numeracy skills among approximately 6,000 primary school students in Sohag. As part of a broader national strategy to enhance educational quality in marginalized areas, this initiative plays a pivotal role in strengthening learning outcomes at the foundational level.

### **Project Achievements in 2024:**

The program marked a major milestone with the successful localization and adaptation of the TaRL methodology. This milestone involved the development of contextually tailored instructional guides, customized educational materials, comprehensive implementation frameworks, and detailed operational timelines.

### **Technical & Vocational Education Program**

The Technical and Vocational Education Training (TVET) Program is dedicated to cultivating a new generation of highly skilled and competent technical professionals. Through the provision of scholarships, TVET enables students to enroll in premier technical schools and institutes across Egypt—including institutions established and managed by the Foundation itself.

In tandem, SFSD remains committed to documenting and disseminating the knowledge, methodologies, and best practices developed through its initiatives, with the aim of promoting scalable and impactful models within the technical education sector. In addition, TVET endeavors to guide students toward high-quality vocational education pathways that offer strong prospects for gainful employment and long-term career development.

### **SFSD Educational Institutions**

### **German Hotel School El Gouna (GHS)**























GHS is Egypt's first private international institution dedicated to hospitality education. Accredited at the highest level by the German Chamber of Industry and Commerce and recognized by the Egyptian Ministry of Education, it offers a certified hotel diploma that combines academic rigor with real-world industry relevance.

GHS follows a dual vocational education model that integrates theoretical instruction with hands-on practical training, delivered under the guidance of both Egyptian and international industry experts. This model is implemented in collaboration with leading hotels across the Red Sea region, equipping students with the skills required to meet the evolving demands of the global hospitality sector.



Students are admitted upon successful completion of preparatory school and are granted partial scholarships or full scholarships. GHS features state-of-the-art classrooms and fully-equipped training laboratories, delivers advanced curricula grounded in experiential learning and hands-on instructional methodologies, and provides high-quality boarding accommodations.

### **Key Milestones In 2024**

- A landmark cooperation protocol was signed between the Leipzig Chamber of Industry and Commerce, SFSD, and GHS, with the aim of expanding employment opportunities for graduates in Germany.
- Ahmed Hamdy, a student at the school, achieved first place nationwide in Egypt's three-year hotel diploma program—an outstanding accomplishment that reflects the school's commitment to academic excellence.
- A strategic partnership with the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD) was successfully concluded, contributing to the enhancement of the school's educational infrastructure and furthering efforts to promote women's employment in the tourism and hospitality sectors.

### **El Gouna Technical Nursing Institute (GTNI)**

Established in 2009 by SFSD, GTNI is recognized as one of Egypt's foremost institutions for technical nursing education. It was founded through an international academic partnership with Lawrence Memorial/Regis College in Massachusetts, USA (2009–2017), and operates under the supervision of the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research.

GTNI is equipped with state-of-the-art facilities and cutting-edge educational technologies, including fully equipped laboratories, providing students with a rigorous and comprehensive academic experience. Its curriculum blends theoretical coursework with practical, hands-on training, effectively preparing students to meet the demands of professional nursing practice.

Through SFSD, full scholarships are offered to eligible high school graduates, with admissions administered and processed through Egypt's national placement system. The academic program spans two and a half years of combined theoretical and clinical instruction, culminating in a mandatory hospital-based internship—a prerequisite for earning the technical nursing diploma.







### Red Sea Yacht (RSY) Institute



Established in 2023 under License No. (1) Issued by the Egyptian Authority for Maritime Safety, the Red Sea Yacht (RSY) Institute is Egypt's first specialized training institution dedicated exclusively to professional yachting. With international accreditation from the Royal Yachting Association (RYA) in the United Kingdom, RSY is positioned at the vanguard of maritime education and training in the region.

Each year, the Institute offers a select number of fully funded scholarships designed to equip aspiring yacht crew members with the skills and certifications required to obtain the prestigious Yachtmaster Certificate for vessels up to 300 tons. Scholarship recipients benefit from an intensive, fully integrated training program that includes:





Mandatory maritime coursework at the Maritime Postgraduate Studies Institute in Alexandria, qualifying participants to obtain a national seafaring license.






### **Higher and Executive Education Program**

### **Key Projects**

### **Egypt Impact Lab**

Egypt Impact Lab (EIL) was launched to support Egypt's poverty reduction policy agenda through the rigorous evaluation of innovative, government-led programs. EIL funds randomized evaluations of government innovations across its core thematic areas, which include:

Social protection and poverty alleviation

Employment generation and support for small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs)

Women's empowerment and family development

Environment, energy, and climate change

In January 2024, EIL hosted the second iteration of the Social Program Evaluation Training at the American University in Cairo (AUC). This intensive, three-day program convened 54 participants from government institutions, development organizations, and donor agencies. Through applied learning, the workshop equipped participants with the practical skills necessary to design and implement randomized evaluations—furthering EIL's broader mission to promote evidence-based policymaking and strengthen the effectiveness of social development initiatives.

In 2024, EIL also launched the second cohort of the MENA Scholars Fellowship—a regional initiative designed to equip researchers across the Middle East and North Africa with the knowledge, tools, and hands-on experience required to develop and conduct high-quality randomized evaluations that inform poverty alleviation policies and advance the reform of social programs.

The Fellowship offers two tailored tracks to support researchers and scholars in their academic and professional journeys:

- **Track One** is designed for PhD candidates in economics or related disciplines. It offers early-stage academic mentorship, along with foundational training and practical exposure to evaluation methodologies.
- Track Two targets postdoctoral researchers and recent PhD graduates in economics or adjacent fields. This track supports their academic advancement and professional growth.

# Capacity Development for Egyptian Incollaboration with Civil Society Organizations



In partnership with CARE Egypt Foundation for Development, and as part of SFSD's ongoing commitment to empowering change agents, a long-term initiative was launched to strengthen the institutional capacities of key civil society organizations (CSOs) across Egypt.

This initiative offers robust capacity-building support—aimed at amplifying the impact and outreach of civil society efforts in Egypt's most underserved communities. At its core, the initiative aspires to enhance the quality and accessibility of civil society services, while nurturing a dynamic ecosystem capable of responding to the evolving needs of marginalized populations.

In 2024, the initiative successfully finalized and deployed a comprehensive Institutional Assessment Tool, which captured and analysed data from 120 beneficiary CSOs. Additionally, it oversaw the establishment and operationalization of new training centres across several governorates—including Cairo, Minya, Assiut, Sohag, and Qena—positioning each as a hub for localized capacity development.

# Development of SFSD's Institutional Framework for Crisis Preparedness, Response, and Recovery

Crafted through close collaboration with the following global partners:











SFSD has developed its first comprehensive institutional strategic framework for crisis preparedness, response, and recovery. This framework sets forth a clear, cohesive roadmap to guide SFSD's actions during times of crisis —ensuring it remains responsive, resilient, and mission-driven.

- Safeguard SFSD's primary beneficiaries, while reaffirming the Foundation's unwavering dedication to its values and mission during times of crisis.
- Integrate development, humanitarian response, and peacebuilding into a cohesive, unified strategic approach that reinforces long-term impact and sustainability.
- Establish a robust operational model for the timely delivery of high-impact and responsive humanitarian assistance during moments of acute need.



# Bridging Continents: South—South Learning Exchange between Egypt and Indonesia

As part of its commitment to advancing evidence-based policymaking, SFSD took part in a high-level Egyptian delegation comprising 15 national entities—including key ministries, public councils, and development institutions—on a strategic knowledge exchange mission to Jakarta, Indonesia.

Organized by Egypt Impact Lab (EIL), the visit aimed to strengthen Egypt's knowledge systems through cultivating cross-regional partnerships and exchanging best practices between the Egyptian and Indonesian governments. The mission focused on supporting the design and implementation of effective, data-driven social protection programs rooted in evidence tailored to local contexts.

The exchange program featured site visits and high-level meetings with leading Indonesian institutions and agencies, including the Ministry of National Development Planning (BAPPENAS), the National Team for the Acceleration of Poverty Reduction (TNP2K), the Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Cultural Affairs, and the Ministry of Social Affairs. These engagements offered valuable insights into Indonesia's nationally coordinated efforts to reduce poverty.

# Joint Events with the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (UN-ESCWA)



### The Third Arab Forum for Equality

Held for the first time in Egypt, the Third Arab Forum for Equality (AFE) convened over two days under the auspices of the Ministry of Social Solidarity. This high-level forum brought together a distinguished array of regional and international actors—including the UN-ESCWA, Sawiris Foundation, Pathfinder Group, and the International Monetary Fund's Middle East Regional Technical Assistance Center (METAC).

Against the backdrop of mounting global disruptions and interlocking crises, this high-level Forum focused on addressing the growing challenge of inequality across the Arab region. Anchored in the findings of the newly released report, "Inequality in the Arab Region: A Vicious Cycle of Crises," the gathering served as a platform for dialogue and discussion—exploring strategic policy pathways towards fostering more inclusive, equitable, and resilient societies.



### National Launch of the "Josour" Initiative in Egypt

As part of the AFE's activities, a dedicated session marked the national launch of the "Josour" initiative in Egypt—an effort supported by SFSD. Launched as a pilot in 2022, Josour is a digital platform designed to enhance youth employability by expanding access to job opportunities and equipping young people with the skills essential for success in today's labor market.

Following its national rollout, two flagship events were convened in Cairo at the end of 2024 to address the evolving challenges facing youth employment. The first was a high-level policy conference that brought together experts and policymakers from Egypt and across the Global South to explore evidence-based strategies for bridging the skills gap and facilitating young people's transition into the workforce.

The second event—a youth-centered roundtable—provided a dynamic platform for dialogue between Egyptian youth and representatives from government, the private sector, academia, and civil society. Key themes included access to employment opportunities, practical training, and the critical role of youth in shaping policy and decision-making processes.



### **Bridging Evidence and Policymaking (BEP)**

A collaborative seminar series developed in partnership with the Egyptian Food Bank and the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI). Conceived as a dynamic platform for participatory learning and interdisciplinary exchange, the series brings together government bodies, academic and research institutions, civil society organizations, and development partners. BEP seeks to embed data-driven approaches within Egypt's public policy ecosystem—strengthening the effectiveness and long-term impact of development efforts through open exchange and collective inquiry.

In 2024, two seminars were convened. The first, "Crises and Response – Development and Humanitarian in the MENA," addressed the urgent imperative to integrate humanitarian response efforts with long-term development strategies—particularly in light of the overlapping crises facing the region. Discussions underscored the need for rapid, evidence-based humanitarian action that balances immediate relief with development goals.

The second seminar, "The Double Burden of Malnutrition," examined one of the most pressing public health challenges facing Egypt today. Participants delved into the complex social, environmental, and systemic factors that contribute to malnutrition, with attention to disparities within food systems, unequal access to nutritious foods, and shifting consumption patterns. SFSD's Learning and Strategy team is developing a policy paper aimed at informing and strengthening national initiatives to reduce malnutrition across all segments of society.



# Seminar on the Impact Assessment of the General Feeding Program

SFSD, in partnership with the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) and the Egyptian Food Bank (EFB), convened a seminar to present the findings of an independent impact evaluation of the General Feeding Program. Designed to support households most vulnerable to hunger, the program provides monthly food boxes containing non-perishable food items aligned with widely preferred dietary patterns.

Conducted by IFPRI with funding from SFSD, the evaluation sought to support EFB in assessing the program's effectiveness in enhancing food security and improving nutritional outcomes among underserved populations. This collaborative initiative reflects the shared commitment of all three partners to grounding social protection and poverty alleviation efforts in rigorous scientific research and data-informed policymaking.

### **Key Ongoing Impact Evaluation Studies**

#### Bab Amal ('A Door of Hope')









To evaluate the effectiveness of the poverty graduation approach, adapted from BRAC International, in improving the livelihoods of ultra-poor households in Upper Egypt. Beyond assessing the program's outcomes, the evaluation also seeks to identify ways to enhance the intervention's cost-effectiveness and scalability.

#### Water is Life





To evaluate different strategies for providing clean water in rural Egypt, specifically by comparing filtered water from treatment units with chlorinated water solutions, to guide policymakers towards more cost-effective alternatives and improve health conditions for millions of Egyptians.

#### Inclusive and Sustainable Development





To explore whether reframing employment opportunities as "volunteering" rather than "formal employment" can enhance women's participation in the labour force and their empowerment in rural Egypt. The evaluation is embedded within a broader development program implemented in Tama District, Sohag Governorate.

#### **Micro-Equity**









To examine how varying financial modalities-namely, interest-bearing loans versus collaborative, interest-free financing, shape decision-making processes and influence outcomes among livestock farmers in Egypt. Key dimensions of analysis include financing preferences, patterns of investment, agricultural productivity, and overall household income.

### Increasing Access to Preschool Education







To assess how expanding access to preschools, featuring high-quality infrastructure and professionally trained educators, could enhance early childhood development outcomes. In parallel, the evaluation explores how access to reliable preschool services enables women to engage more actively in socially and economically empowering activities.

### Advancing Arab Philanthropic Partnerships and Collaborations

This follow-up report presents key insights from the 2023 Arab Philanthropy Forum in Cairo, bringing together over 40 philanthropic organizations. It analyzes the evolving landscape, highlights collaboration opportunities, and outlines strategic pathways to build a more inclusive, effective, and enabling ecosystem for sustainable partnerships and collective impact across the Arab world.



#### Targeting in Development Projects in Egypt – Policy Note

This policy note captures the key outcomes of a high-level workshop convened in Cairo in October 2023, which convened researchers, development practitioners, and policymakers for an in-depth dialogue on development targeting. ### **About** the Award

For 20 years, the Sawiris Cultural Award (SCA) has held a distinguished place in Egypt's cultural landscape, serving as a reliable platform for celebrating literary and artistic excellence in all its richness and diversity. Since its launch in 2005, the Award has succeeded in building a bridge between generations of writers—paying tribute to established literary figures whose works have shaped Egypt's cultural consciousness, while amplifying the voices of emerging talents whose contemporary perspectives mirror the evolving spirit of Egyptian society.

The award aims to create a safe and open space for writers to express themselves, and contribute to cultural discourse by spotlighting works that explore human and social issues with honesty and depth. Its categories span an expansive array of genres – including the novel, short story, screenplay, playwriting, literary criticism and non-fiction, and children's literature - reflecting its commitment to supporting diverse forms of literary expression and expanding their horizons.

Following two decades of giving, the Sawiris Cultural Award stands not only as framework for honouring literary excellence but also as a cornerstone of Egypt's contemporary cultural movement—advocating for the transformative power of literature and the arts as indispensable forces in shaping a more conscious, and humane society. The award will continue to perform its role as a catalyst for literary innovation and a platform that seeks to empower new generations of writers and creators, to draft new chapters that tell the history of Egypt's culture, and fulfil its aspirations.

## Pola Tadros

From the Shortlist to the Award Spotlight



My name is Bola, I'm thirty years old. I studied engineering, but just two or three weeks into my first job, I realized it wasn't the path for me. Before applying for the Sawiris Cultural Award, I was working in advertising—and I still am today. I'm waiting for the day writing can be my sole livelihood.

The story began long ago. As children, my brother and I were obsessed with cinema. There was a video rental shop in our building, and we would borrow tapes almost daily. We watched all the films it had —Egyptian, international, Indian, European. One time we rented an Italian film with no subtitles and we still, we sat fully engrossed—laughing and crying, reacting as if we understood every word. That moment has stayed with me ever since. It was the first time I realized that art could move you even without words. I wanted to be a part of that magic, even if I still had to find my place in it.

I started writing about fifteen years ago. In the beginning, I only shared my work with a few friends—people outside the industry, but they had good taste and understanding. understood that feedback from the wrong person can kill a promising project before it

I had been following the Sawiris Cultural Award for years and the high calibre of its judges, who were big names in the field. I submitted my first screenplay during the COVID-19 lockdown—when the world was in pause and people had time to write. For me, just applying for the award was a big step in my commitment towards writing, I never imagined I would actually win.

When the results were announced, I couldn't believe it. It felt surreal. It was the first time in my life I had ever been paid for my writing. The Award was more than recognition—it was a turning point. Suddenly, people began to listen, producers took notice, my name started to carry weight. Doors I had long assumed were sealed began to open.

The screenplay that won in the Emerging Writers Category was titled Abdullah. It's inspired by deeply personal story, inspired by my uncle—a man from whom our family had grown estranged due to his difficult nature. When he ended up in a nursing home, he became terribly lonely. One day, after years of silence, he began to speak again—as though something long dormant had been awakened. It was because of a young Sudanese caregiver named Abdallah. That moment stayed with me. I kept wondering: how was it that we—his own family—could not reach him, and yet a stranger could? I decided to write the story.

The film follows a young Sudanese man who flees war and finds work in a nursing home. As he navigates his new life, he begins to connect with others, confront the traumas of his past, and gradually reclaim his sense of self. The story is about the human experience – about forgiveness, companionship, and meaning.

Abdallah was developed through the Torino Film Lab and received production awards from several prestigious institutions and festivals, including the Red Sea Fund, MBC, Rotana, Shift Studios, Canal+, and others. We are now working on the seventh draft of the script, with filming scheduled to begin in November 2025, God willing.

At present, I am working on this film and working on another one with C-Cinema. I'm also working on a new TV series with screenwriter Mariam Naoum, set to be released soon.

My hope is that opportunities in this field become accessible to anyone with talent—not just those with the right name or connections. I hope we continue to judge creative work on its merit, not by who made it. To anyone dreaming of entering this world, I would say: don't chase success. Write because you love to write, not for an award or fame. The road is long, yes—but every step will teach you, and bring you closer to yourself. It's a magical journey with many discoveries, the first of which is, who you truly are.

# MoU Signing to Expand the Impact of Bab Amal



As part of the foundation's efforts to scale its flagship program "Bab Amal (Door of Hope)," which aims to reduce multidimensional poverty and help extremely poor families graduate out of poverty, new strategic partnerships were formed. The Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) committed CHF 1 million to serve 2,800 ultra-poor households—enabling sustainable transitions out of extreme poverty. Additionally, ExxonMobil Egypt signed a second annex of the MoU previously signed, contributing an extra EGP 1 million, bringing its total investment to EGP 2,060,000 in Upper Egypt.




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### **Cities of Egypt Exhibition**

Under the auspices of the Ministry of Social Solidarity, the Back to School celebration was held for the fourth consecutive year, bringing together 900 children from marginalized communities, including ten care homes and nonprofit organizations across Greater Cairo.
